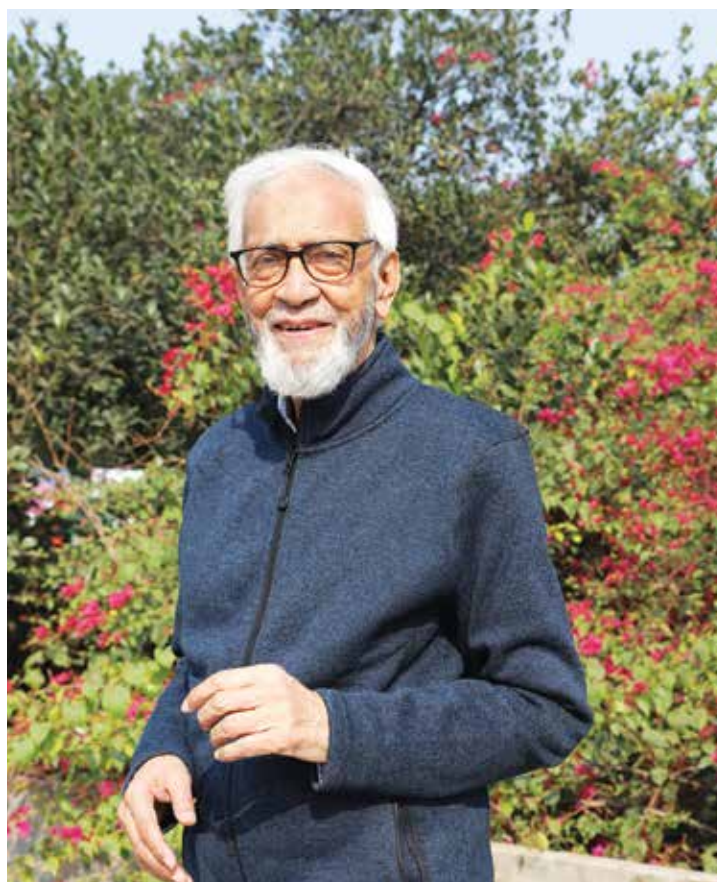

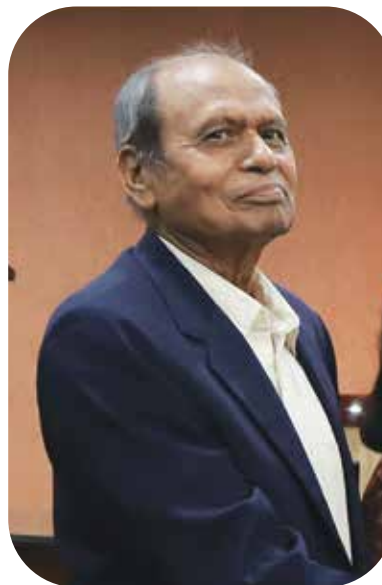

Medical Services

Regular patient follow-up by Medical Services Wing

Medical Service Wing (MSW) provide services through Inpatient and Outpatient services. Adult or Paediatric patients with rheumatology, neurology, and orthopedic problems are treated by our OPD medical officers and consultants from 8 am to 5 pm (on week days). Spinal Cord Injured patients need to be admitted into inpatient service if surgery is required for a patient. Our surgery team including Neuro, Orthopedic and Plastic surgeon does it in an earliest manner in our well-equipped Operation theatre. A holistic approach provides outstanding conservative and Rehabilitation services that can be replicated in any low and middle-income countries (LMICs). For inpatients and outpatients, we have the facilities for X-rays, ultra-sonograms, and pathology tests.

Physiotherapy

In the spirit of unwavering dedication to our core values and commitment to providing exceptional rehabilitation services, the Department of Physiotherapy remains committed to providing seamless care in the fiscal year 2022-23 with a renewed sense of purpose. Since its establishment in 1979 as a part of CRP, Physiotherapy department is delivering quality care to the individuals in need. Throughout the previous fiscal year, despite the challenging circumstances posed by Long COVID, we persisted in our mission to offer comprehensive rehabilitation services.

With an interdisciplinary team approach, the physiotherapy department cared for 26,221 outpatients with musculoskeletal and neurological condition in addition to 301 in-patients with Spinal Cord Injury (SCI). These efforts ensured that a wide range of individuals had access to quality care and rehabilitation services.

Through diligent analysis of data collected from the Low Back Pain Discharge Assessment, the report shows a remarkable reduction in pain and disability, accompanied by a substantial improvement in their overall quality of life (QoL).

To further our mission of raising awareness, the department has engaged with the community through platforms such as "Live-Facebook" and "YouTube Programs," allowing us to share valuable information about physiotherapy and related topics. Additionally, collaborations with national television channels have facilitated informative shows that reach a broader audience.

Mohammad Anwar Hossain, Head of the Physiotherapy department earned a prestigious PhD from Jashore Science and Technology University (JUST). His research study on Long COVID created an example in the academic community.

On September 8th, 2022, the Physiotherapy department held celebrations for World Physiotherapy Day by publishing a special supplement to two national newspapers, hosting a live Facebook program, webinar, and documentary filming, and messages from the Honorable Prime Minister and the relevant ministries.



Occupational Therapy

Occupational Therapy (OT) is one of the indispensable rehabilitation services offered by CRP. OT services became most demanded which is available at all the CRP service delivery centres across the country. In the light of core values of CRP, the OT department provides evidence based quality services to a wide range of people affected with and vulnerable to functional limitations due to disease, injury, illness, impairment and disability. The prime goal of OT service is to improve client's level of functional independence, ensure/enhance their participation & quality of life through the use of therapeutic exercises, variety of treatment modalities, engagement in purposeful activities, modification & customized assistive devices and many more.

In the reporting year, the outpatient service of OT department, CRP Savar provided treatment to 3,694 patients covering a total of 49,786 treatment sessions. The Hand Therapy and Splinting unit provided 1,105 customized splints and assistive devices. In OT Spinal Cord Injury (SCI) in-patient unit 252 (84%) patients completed all phases of rehabilitation out of 301 admissions. Their functional outcomes based on SCIM (Spinal Cord Independence Measure) were completely independent 24 (9%), independent with modified environment 168 (67%), independent with moderate support 41 (16%) & independent with maximum support 19 (8%) individual with SCI. A total of 1,298 group therapy sessions were conducted (Out-patient 350 & In-patient 948), where the number of participants were 3,405. A number of 80 OT professionals participated in different skills development training & workshops.

In an invitation from the ASCoN Conference 2022 India, Ms. Kamrunnaher, Jr. Consultant- OT facilitated a workshop. In that conference, research abstracts of 6 OTs were nominated for awarding competitions & Ms. Bethi Akter won the Spinal Cord Society Gold Medal Award for "Best Oral Paper Presenter". In June, 2023 Ms. Aldina Murphy, an OT student from the UK came to volunteer in clinical settings at OT Dept. of CRP-Savar for two months.

Speech and Language Therapy

Speech & Language Therapy is a healthcare field of expertise practiced globally and specializes in the evaluation, diagnosis, treatment, and prevention of communication disorders (speech and language impairments), cognitive-communication disorders, voice disorders, fluency disorder and swallowing disorder and continue counseling and other follow-up services for these disorders across the lifespan.

Speech and Language Therapists provide services to adult outpatients, paediatric inpatients and outpatients, SCI Unit, William and Marie Taylor School, Emergency Unit and the Multi-Disciplinary Team. The demand has been increasing daily and a total of 6,766 patients (both adult and children) received Speech & Language Therapy service through 44,419 individual sessions and 2006 group sessions from out-patient units during the reporting year, including 143 patients with SCI. Total 28 qualified Speech & Language Therapists are working in CRP Savar, Mirpur and other sub-centers.

During the reporting year the department had a great benefit from the input of a foreign professional named Ms. Candace Myers from Canada who made her fourth visit to CRP from 05/05/23 to 24/05/23 and helped the dept. in both management of clinical issues as well as with educational purpose. A number of Speech and Language Therapists from all sub-centers of CRP including Savar participated in several training (e.g. oral placement therapy, autism management, voice management etc) throughout the year.



Monthly Awareness Class in Stroke Rehabilitation Unit

Stroke Rehabilitation Unit (SRU) started its extended service on July 2022 at CRP Savar. The main goal of the unit is to ensure comprehensive rehabilitation services through a multidisciplinary team approach to the patient with stroke who are using the patient accommodation facilities at CRP-Savar. Total 19 staff & interns are working here (7 Physiotherapists, 7 Occupational therapists, 3 Speech & language therapist and In charge and 1 support staff).

Regular services of SRU are physiotherapy, occupational therapy, speech and language therapy, home based rehabilitation (HBR), group therapies, patient awareness class, multi-disciplinary team meeting. Moreover, extensive consultancy of Neuro-medicine Specialists strengthens the service outcome.

Major achievements of SRU throughout the fiscal year 2022-2023 are developing SRU service delivery protocol and including the World Stroke Day in the CRP'S annual day observation plan. This unit treats more than 60 patients with stroke everyday as per outpatient appointment.

Paediatric Unit

The Centre for the Rehabilitation of the Paralyzed (CRP) commenced the Paediatric Unit to execute its mission in 1995. Through the magnificent services to the children with disabilities and their families, this unit has advanced into the Paediatric Department of CRP with extended services and a larger number of beneficiaries in 2020.

At a glance of new patients who received treatment from this department in the 2022-2023 fiscal years, a total of 851 inpatients, 2272 with Cerebral palsy and others condition and 635 with autism spectrum disorders, as outpatient. Where the total session was 31334. 1713 children with club feet got treatment also.

To ensure decidedly standard therapeutic services such as Physiotherapy, Occupational therapy as well as Speech and Language therapy for children with different neurological and neurodevelopmental disorders, 30 experienced professionals are working with great devotion and commitment in this department.

Besides the regular one-to-one therapy sessions, our children with different disabilities also receive consultation from the Senior Paediatric consultant, nursing care, and several goal-oriented group therapies along with outreach programs and so on. In collaboration with MAITS-UK and CRP, there is a ToT program on "Working with Children with Neuro-Developmental Disorders" which started in 2021. One Occupational therapist from the Paediatric Department successfully accomplished the "L-3 Trainer" of MAITS- UK and few are on process. Our therapists attended various trainings to strengthen their knowledge and skill to serve the client. Auhana Hannan and Auroni Hannan two volunteers from Texas, USA, observed and shared their knowledge in the Paediatric Department.



Children with Orthosis

The Prosthetics and Orthotics Department of CRP began its journey in 2002 with the technical and financial support of the International Committee of the Red Cross (ICRC). Prosthetists and Orthotists work in a multidisciplinary team including doctor, orthopedic surgeon, physiotherapist and other rehab professional. The Department provides required prosthetic and orthotic devices for a wide range of orthopaedic and neurological conditions including Cerebral Palsy, Stroke, Guillain-Barré Syndrome (GBS), Spinal Cord Injury, Post-Polio Syndrome, post-fracture complications, congenital anomalies and amputation.

In the reporting year, the P&O Department served 4,861 patients with a total of 2,406 devices including 2,170 orthoses, 161 prostheses, 91 elbow crutches, 75 orthopedic shoes and 124 pairs of axillary crutches.

In addition to ICRC Technology, P&O department has given importance on other modern technology like Ottobock to meet the service demand. An extensive outreach program is ongoing where PO service is not available particularly in remote area. The contribution of ICRC is noteworthy in terms of skill development, as well as sponsoring staff for higher education. Four staff from this department have already completed their bachelor level professional study in India and Thailand, three of them are continuing their services at CRP-Savar and one at CRP-Barisal. In addition, three certified ISPO category-3 technicians are providing services, two at Savar and one at Barisal. The working space has also been extended during the reporting year. Orthotics services are also provided for spinal pathology such as scoliosis, kyphosis, lordosis and other difficulties. Currently, there are two P & O professionals providing spinal orthosis services who have completed their bachelor's degrees from Mahidol University, Thailand.

Supportive Seating Unit



“Supportive Seating for Independent Mobility” for the Children with Cerebral Palsy

Supportive seating unit (SSU) of CRP has passed an extraordinarily successful year with the concept of “Supportive Seating for Independent Mobility” for the children with cerebral palsy. The main aim of this Supportive seating unit is to serve high quality mobility support and assistive device to CRP Clients and around all over Bangladesh according to individual need. Modified supportive seat and wheelchair for children with disabilities can provide health, functional, developmental and social benefits.

Many children with Cerebral Palsy can not seat independently therefore SSU produces supportive seating device in three different designs for them. SSU produces other form of rehabilitation devices including Lumbar Roll, cervical pillow, wheelchair cushions, shoulder slings, D-Roll, T- Roll, cervical collar, gaiter, bed mattress. In this reporting year, the unit produced and delivered 459 supportive seating chairs, 153 supportive seating follow up appointment, 260 supportive seating assessments, 267 screening and 245 wooden chairs for children with disabilities. In this year, the number of total other assistive device products from SSU is 8275. The Unit also supported to Disabled Rehabilitation & Research Association (DRRA), Bachte Shekha, Sishu Polli Plus, CZM, Handicap International (HI), Children Hope (CH), Dhaka Proyash, Kapasia Protibondhi Kollan Somity, all with the aim of provision of assistive device and ensuring proper seating for their clients. The In charge of SSU had conducted 3 training session as a project coordinator collaboration with MAITS and CRP on Neuro Developmental Disability (NDD). In this reporting year, Dr. Mel Adams, technical advisor of MAITS Program and Shabnom Rangwala, Master trainer of MAITS Program had visited CRP for conducting project related meeting.

APT unit produces numerous types of assistive devices using wastage paper in low resource setting. The most popular products created by APT include paper seating chairs, feeding chairs, hand therapeutic toys, riding horse, balance boards, different types of show pieces amongst others.

As previous Jon and Janet, APT experts from UK visited CRP and conduct training at CRP vocational training institute. Their contribution to development is noteworthy. APT has the potential to transfigure the production of assistive devices traditionally fabricated from wood, leather, metal and other expensive media since in uses waste materials like- waste paper, plastic bottles, thin card and corrugated Cardboard. In this reporting year APT Unit has produced and delivered cylindrical grasp board 154 pieces, manipulation ring set 96 pieces, Bottle set 303 pieces and different toy 110pieces different toys with raw material support from different organization like Viyella Tax Group, Hamim Group. We had delivered 457 pieces of bottle set to Handicap International.

Rehabilitation Services Wing

Social Welfare Department

The Social Welfare Department (SWD) is one of the integral parts of CRP's comprehensive rehabilitation services. CRP believes, no one should be left untreated because some occasions impoverished patients and people with disabilities could not afford medical treatment, rehabilitation, and assistive devices expenses in CRP facilities. Likewise, previous years, with the support of generous donors, CRP's Social Welfare Department (SWD) provides subsidies for the treatment and rehabilitation expenses of poor socioeconomic patients and clients. By practice lion shares of allocated subsidies are enjoyed by patients with spinal cord injuries in CRP Medical Services Wing. The SWD assesses the socio-economic condition of unprivileged patients and offers subsidies on treatment expenses, surgical interventions, and assistive devices accordingly.

The SWD responded well to recent monetary inflation by ensuring extra subsidies on treatment expenses, and devices for people with spinal cord injuries, and persons with disabilities. Apart from ensuring related subsidies for poor socioeconomic patients and clients the SWD is committed to ensuring weekly outreach events, life skills training, and recreational visits (historical place and annual picnic) for admitted patients with spinal cord injury patients. The SWD remains on standby to support patients and persons with disabilities in emergency cases like a medical referral, or special discharge and shifting of the clients and needs the base to follow up.

Persons with disabilities make up an estimated one-tenth of our population and can contribute in a significant way to the development of the country if their right to skilled and decent work is promoted and protected. Nowadays, the Government of Bangladesh has shown a strong commitment to the inclusion of persons with disabilities in skills training and decent job placement. CRP Madhab Memorial Vocational Training Institute (CRP MMVTI) has proven its commitment and ensures quality skills training for persons with disabilities.

The CRP MMVTI became a popular desired training institute among people with physical disabilities for grooming their required capacity skills in different vocational courses and acquiring social inclusion orientation. The CRP MMVTI offers free vocational skills training for persons with disabilities. This fiscal year CRP MMVTI has made an MoU with Palli Karma-Sahayak Foundation (PKSF) to launch a project titled “Training Programs for the Disadvantaged Group (Persons with Disability)”.

A total of 357 people with disabilities received vocational training and among them, a total of 154 training graduates people with disabilities were deployed to job markets during this reporting period.

Aim of CRP MMVTI: To ensure economic and social empowerment of persons with disabilities through skills training, and self and wage employment.

Counseling

Spinal cord injury (SCI) is a life-changing event that has an impact on all aspects of life in daily living. Developing stress is common after SCI and is also insidious. It can build quietly over time, clouding the mind and diminishing all aspects of brainpower. It also damages our body's immune system. The counseling department helps people with SCI for appraisal coping focusing on dealing with the loss and mindful living. We explore the client's ways of thinking, acceptance of limitations, learn, and master the new skills that are important to incorporate them into daily life in the context of the "real world."

Counseling Services

- ▶ **New SCI cases:** – A total of 301 new cases received counseling services in various aspects of psychosocial health needs
- ▶ **Counseling sessions:** – 1781 professional counseling sessions, 1858 peer counseling sessions, and 342 spiritual counseling sessions.
- ▶ **Psychosexual Services:** – 74 couples and 73 young adults as well as 10 outpatients with SCI in a hospital setting and 44 people with SCI in the community had received psychosexual service under 281 sessions.
- ▶ **Health Education MP3 Audio clip share:** – A total of 205 admitted patients with SCI received MP3 format health education via mobile phones
- ▶ **Group Sessions:** A total of 313 group sessions were conducted including psychoeducation, role model sessions, audio sessions, reproductive health and sexual counseling groups, behavioral changes, and capacity building.
- ▶ **Pressure Sores Phone Follow-up:** A total of 178 SCI with pressure ulcers received telephonic intervention –To date, there were 76% (135/178) of persons with SCI benefited via telehealth service regarding pressure ulcer problems in the community. Among them, 33.14% (59/178) of pressure sores have healed up, and 42.69 % (76/178) are improving.
- ▶ **Tele-health well-being phone call services sessions for people with SCI in communities**
A total of 725 people with SCI were communicated by phone but 608 patients received telehealth service.
- ▶ **Post-discharge Immediate phone follow-up service-** In this fiscal year, a total of 180 clients with SCIs received a phone to do follow-up immediately after discharge for increasing resilience in the community with new challenges.

Community Based Rehabilitation

Community-based rehabilitation (CBR) was initiated by the WHO following the Declaration of Alma-Ata in 1978, in an effort to enhance the quality of life for people with disabilities and their families, meet their basic needs, and ensure their inclusion and participation. CBR is a strategy that works for people with disabilities in their community. It supports the inclusion of people with disabilities in the life of their communities. It also helps to meet the unmet needs of people with disabilities within their communities. CRP started its CBR activities in 1996 to spread awareness about disability and the follow-up of spinal cord injury patients in their community. CBR is one of the important channels for discharged persons with SCI for their future rehabilitation way forward.

Nowadays, CBR activities of CRP involve working closely with people with disabilities and their families to overcome physical and sociological barriers within their communities, through a holistic approach to the person and their environment in the areas of health, education, livelihood, social inclusion, skill development, and empowerment.

The activities of CRP CBR are implemented through the combined efforts of people with disabilities themselves and their families, donors, organizations, and communities, and the relevant governmental and non-governmental health, education, vocational, social, and other services.

Joynob Begum (55y) lives in a rural area with extreme poverty. An accident made her wheelchair bound. But she is motivated to live like before so she asked for cattle support from CRP. Now she raises the cattle and sells milk to maintain her living expenses.

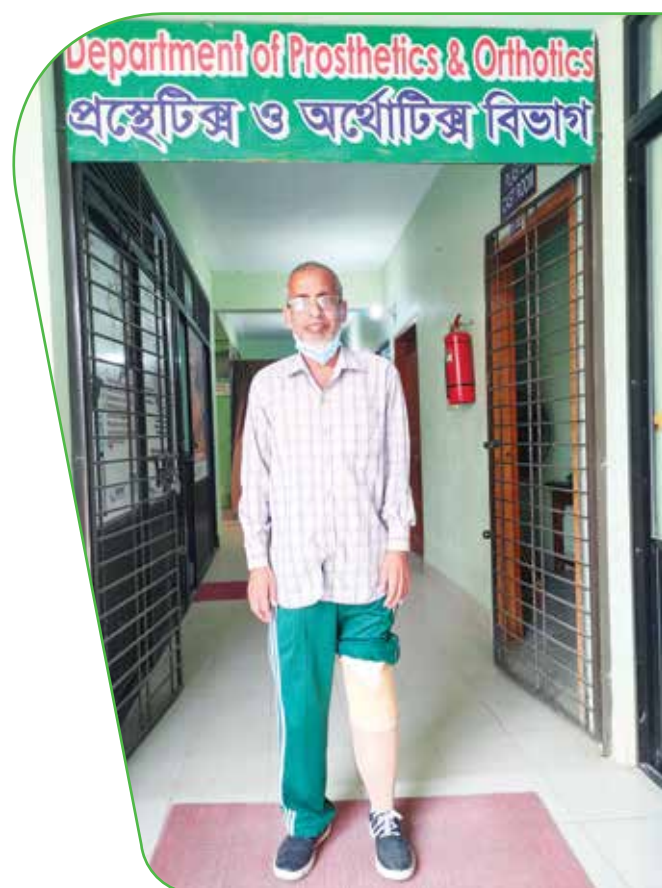

A Case Study

Md. Asraful Alam, is a 51 years old man, who works as a Lecturer in Mathematics in Gol-Gofur High School and College. He has four (4) members in his family; including himself, his wife, daughter and son. He is the only member of his family earning a wage. He has been suffering from diabetes for the last 14 years. He has diabetic feet due to them being neuropathic. In July 2022, he was first injured by standing on the dead bone of an animal presumed to be a cow bone which injured his great left toe (Hallux). This injury caused an infection in his great toe. The infection increased day by day, until he was admitted to a hospital. His infection gradually spread to below his knee. The surgeon decided to operate for a Trans-Tibial amputation. He now needs a Trans-Tibial prosthesis device in his left leg. When he first came to CRP, he was using axillary crutches for his mobility. He was unable to go to his office and was staying in his home with other family members. He couldn't earn any money for his family. He was leading a miserable life and felt he had become hopeless, he thought that, it is impossible for him to lead a normal lifestyle again. He received his treatment from the department of Prosthetics and Orthotics for his artificial limb and took some pre-prosthetic physiotherapy training for increasing muscle power and again for gait training after fitting the prosthetic. Now, he is leading a functional life style. He has again returned to his teaching profession and is using his prosthesis device for his mobility. Now he is earning money for his family and spending quality life with them again

With state-of-the-art facilities, international-standard classrooms, and laboratories, the school provides students with superior education and practical training, holding CAT II accreditation from the International Society for Prosthetics and Orthotics (ISPO), highlighting its commitment to high educational standards.

External support from the International Committee of the Red Cross (ICRC) and PRIMARK enhances the school's success, providing scholarships, materials, patient support, and salary assistance to international faculty. Within the nurturing embrace of our hostel, one dedicated house mother, supported by a team of 22 compassionate staff members, ensures that each child receives personalized care and attention. This harmonious blend of therapies and supportive residential care defines our commitment to fostering an environment where every child can thrive, irrespective of their challenges.

In addition, the following activities were ensured in the reporting year:

1. Teacher's Day 2022 was celebrated by discussing and sharing the importance of the day among the teachers on 5th October 2022.

The Marks & Start project provides RMG-based training, creating employment opportunities, and Mental Health Project offers essential day care services, including tailored occupational therapy for individuals with psychological impairments. The Women's Rehabilitation Unit within the centre emerges as a hub for skills development, offering training in sewing and crafting, accompanied by accommodation facilities that cultivate a supportive environment for female trainees. Ganakbari Centre transcends its role as a mere rehabilitation facility, evolving into a transformative force that goes beyond physical healing. It functions as a community where women with SCI regain independence, showcase talents, and contribute meaningfully to society. This multifaceted approach encapsulates the essence of Ganakbari Centre—where empowerment, skill-building, and inclusivity converge to shape a brighter and more equitable future for the women it serves.

Additionally, the center spearheads Community Based Rehabilitation (CBR) services in the greater Mymensingh region. A dedicated team comprising 5 Physiotherapists, 2 Occupational Therapists, and 3 Speech & Language Therapists deliver specialized rehabilitation services, underscoring the center's commitment to comprehensive care. In the reporting year, the centre introduced Pantry Services catering to the needs of both patients and staff members.

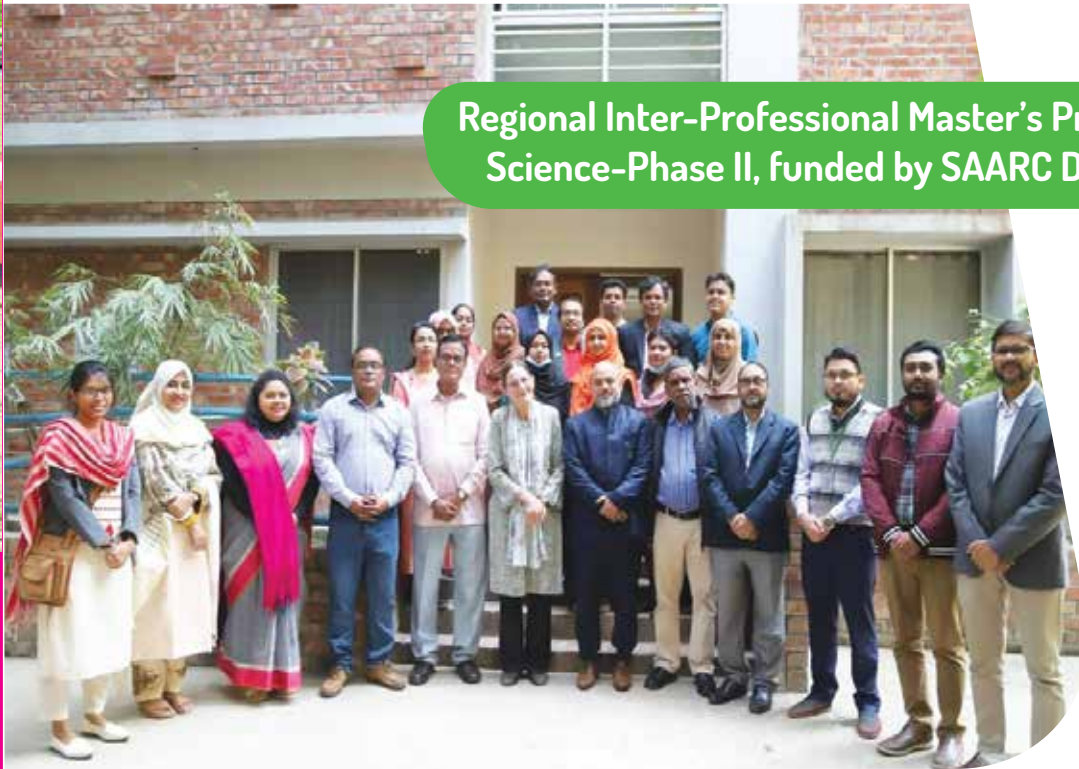
CRP Manikganj

Enhancing accessibility, a steel ramp funded by ICRC was constructed at the building's rear, facilitating easy access for trainees with disabilities to reach the basketball court. This initiative exemplifies CRP's commitment to inclusivity and ensuring a supportive environment for all.

Projects

Regional Inter-Professional Master's Program in Rehabilitation Science-Phase II, funded by SAARC Development Fund (SDF)



Inauguration of the sixth batch of Master's Program in Rehabilitation Science

The project phase II (July 2022 to June 2023) started through signing of the project financing agreement on 26th July, 2022. The phase II is expected to resulting enrollment of 135 students from SAARC Member States with 85 fully funded & 50 partially funded scholarships. Scholarships were provided to 120 students from SAARC Member States during the project phase I (June 2013 to May 2020) until the fifth batch.

A SDF Social Window team (Monitoring & Evaluation and Communication) visited CRP-BHPI, Bangladesh on 27th August, 2022. The team met with CRP project management team and 20 beneficiaries (Alumni) of the project phase I from around the campus or Dhaka. The participants shared their views with the SDF team regarding challenges, lessons learned, best practices, needs, strength & weakness in relation to project implementation and impact.

An inauguration program was held on 4th December, 2022 at BHPI-CRP campus for the sixth batch under the project phase II. There are 12 students from Bangladesh and one student from Sri Lanka in the sixth batch.

Meaningful Social Access for the Persons with Mental Health Needs (MAP) Project

The Kadoorie Charitable Foundation (KCF) is funding this project as a continuation of first phase, implemented and co-funded by CRP. Under this project CRP is operating two (02) mental health day centre in CRP-Mirpur and CRP-Ganakbari. Both centers are delivering mental health support to the people with mental health needs. An experienced team of occupational therapist, clinical psychologist and psychiatrist is working in MDT approach to enhance clients' quality of living. During this reporting period, 188 people (male- 115, female- 73) with mental health needs received services from mental health day centers. Community reintegration followed by the

discharge is a unique component of this project for this group of people. 39 clients received vocational training in different trade aiming to facilitate proper integration into the community. 15 clients received Income Generating Activities support for small business start-up and 5 clients received job placement support. Two (2) clients received livestock (Calf) and thirteen (13) clients received grocery items as IGA support. Clients who received livestock, they will take care of it as instructed during training and sell them when suitable to make profit. They will use the base price again to buy a new one for next profit. Clients who received grocery items, they are running a small shop in their community after receiving shop management training. All of them have started successfully. Simultaneously, project team is working to sensitise the local community to eliminate stigma against mental illness and support seeking. Different awareness and advocacy activities with different stakeholders are ongoing in 10 Upazillas surrounding Dhaka.

Microeconomic Project, CBR, Rehabilitation Wing

The economic inclusion and empowerment of persons with disabilities (PWDs) have gained significant attention in recent years. Microeconomic Initiative (MEI) project, CRP offers cash grants/in-kind support to persons with disabilities to enhance their economic empowerment and ensure social inclusion. The International Committee of the Red Cross (ICRC) provides financial and technical assistance to the Microeconomic Initiative (MEI) project in order to distribute economic grants to purchase micro or small business items for their small business enterprises. This initiative aims to empower persons with disabilities by enabling them to start their Income Generation Activities (IGA) or find suitable self-employment opportunities for their respective livelihood

Since 2018 MEI project has been working to support people with disabilities IGA in different districts in Bangladesh mainly focusing on microeconomic support in different project categories. Following the succession of the last 6 years of support information for the MEI project.

Microeconomic Initiative Project:

During the reporting year (2022-23) Microeconomic Initiative (MEI) has allocated cash grants totaling 37,30,000 BDT to 74 people with disabilities in various districts in order to help them become economically empowered by establishing income-generating activities in 33 small grocery stores, 10 electronics repair shops, 11 tailoring shops, 7 computer accessories shops, 7 auto rickshaws, and 6 multiple businesses

Marks & Start Industrial Project

To raise aspirations, integrate employment, and strengthen social inclusion for persons with disabilities, by enabling them to move towards a capable skilled workforce in Readymade Garments (RMGs) the Marks & Start Industrial project, CRP offers free industrial skill training courses and 100% job placement. Ensuring skills training and inclusion in mainstreaming wage employment in Marks & Spencer supply factories CRP beneficiaries (Persons with disabilities) can achieve socio-economic independence and be able to redefine their respective life roles. The Marks & Start project is a Corporate Social Responsibility (CSR) initiative of Marks & Spencer Bangladesh and since 2006 has been promoting inclusive training and job placements for CRP beneficiaries. To date, a total of 3484 persons with disabilities have gained industrial sewing and linking skills through free residential training facilities.

EKOTA Project

The EKOTA project from MJF, funded by USAID, started in March 2023 and will end in August 2027. It will cover 9 (nine) unions of 3 (three) Upazilas in Dhaka and Manikganj district (Saturia, Manikganj; Savar & Nawabganj, Dhaka). The project will work with 1300 direct beneficiaries.

The Project objectives are strengthening the OPDs, ensuring accessibility to government services, especially legal aid services, and producing skilled human resources.

Project activities include OPD selection, create self-help groups, project inception, skills development training, day celebration jointly with local govt., training on disability rights, law, and legal aid funds, coordination meetings with different local government departments, and leadership training.

OPD selection and inceptions have been done in three Upazila and, 37 self-help groups are created. Training on Rights and Protection for the Persons with Disabilities Act 2013 and Legal Aid Fund took place.

Equitable and Inclusive Health and Rehabilitation for Persons with Disability (EIHRPD) Project



EIHRPD Project Inception Program at CRP Mirpur

CRP is undertaking a project that will span three years (starting from December, 2022), aimed at developing accessible and equitable health and rehabilitation services for people with disabilities in Bangladesh. The project aims to include women and girls with disabilities as well. Women with Disability Development Foundation (WDDF) and four local implementing partners Upazila Disabled People Development Council (UDPDCs) will work together with CRP as sub-partners to achieve the project's goals.

The project will be implemented in Manikganj Sadar, Ghior, Daulatpur, and Harirampur Upazila of Manikganj District, and will receive financial and technical support from CBM Global Disability Inclusion. The project was officially launched in the presence of significant national and local stakeholders, including high-level government officials at CRP Mirpur and CRP Manikganj.

As of June 2023, the project has conducted four awareness events with a total of 519 attendees, a disability screening campaign with 71 participants, including ten persons with disabilities, and observed World Autism Awareness Day and International Women's Day in respective areas. Additionally, a training session on OPD's Capacity Building has taken place.

Other Departments

Human Resources
